A COMMENTARY ON THE FITTES ONE TO SIX

The Old Saxon Heliand, a gospel harmony consisting of almost six thousand lines presenting the events of Christ's life on earth, was written in alliterative verse some time in the ninth century. Although the first full edition was published in 1830, it still poses countless problems to the reader. The poem is a challenging combination of Germanic verse form and Christian content, for the author was a gifted vernacular poet who also worked in accordance with contemporary theology. Little is known of the poem's origins, the date or place of its composition, the purpose for which it was written, its author or its intended audience and its reception. Five manuscripts of

the poem, including three fragments, have survived, quite a surprising number for a vernacular work. This Commentary provides a critical line-by-line analysis of the first six sections, or *fittes*, of the poem, which cover the main elements of the Nativity narrative. It explores different aspects of the text, consolidating and synthesising the extensive earlier scholarly research, commenting where appropriate on the relevant grammatical, morphological, phonological and syntactic features of each line or word, and examining individual passages or words against the wider literary, historical and theological background of the ninth century. Ten excursuses throughout the Commentary enable discussion in greater depth of some of the most problematic issues confronting the modern reader, including the structure, dating, and contemporary audience, as well as the controversial themes of Germanisation and fate within the poem. Through its detailed analysis of the introductory *fittes* and of these particular problems, the Commentary aims to foster a deeper understanding of the Heliand as a whole within its contemporary cultural context.

In Wolfram's story, warring Christians and Muslims are brought together in peace by the power of the Grail - a stone Murphy believes still exists. An entirely original reading of Wolfram's famous text, this engrossing and accessible book appeals not only to scholars and students of medieval literature but to anyone who is drawn to the lasting mystery of the Holy Grail.
